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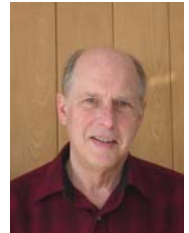

David Lane, reference librarian with the Hennepin County Library, demonstrated how to access some of the wealth of woodworking information that can be obtained through the extensive library system in the state of Minnesota, all for free with your library card. For example, he showed us a Stanley #8 Transitional Plane he bought and how he found out specific information about it. He dated the plane using the classic Stanley reference book. This yielded a range of dates. There was an owners name stamped on the plane and with that and a range of dates, David was able to find the owner's name in the 1870 census. He also found the names of family and related friends that allowed him to trace the plane from the original owner to David himself. He never had to leave his computer to gather all this information.

David also discussed how to use WORLDCAT look up libraries that support e-mailing questions to the Librarian. He did that with a Rabbit Plane with the plane maker, A.G. Moore, stamped on the end. He e-mailed questions about the plane and they replied with the name and dates for the plane maker.

David provided the list of references that follow at the meeting. As he said, "Happy Hunting".

## Course Description

### **CABINET MAKING**

Cabinet making is the fundamental place to start woodworking. In this intensive class Marc will discuss design, layout, common materials, the difference between face frames and faceless cabinets, the joinery process, how to assemble the carcass, ways to make doors and drawers, how to mount the hardware, working with laminates and quick ways to finish the cabinet. This class is designed for anyone wanting to learn how to make cabinets. If you are considering cabinet making as a future source of income or just enjoy working with wood, this is the class you have been waiting for.

### **FUNDAMENTAL WOODWORKING**

This class will help you advance your woodworking skills by leaps and bounds and would be perfect for beginners as well as intermediates. Marc will cover several elements of woodworking including design, wood movement, joinery techniques, working with veneer and finishing. There will be demonstrations on truing boards, sharpening common edge tools, cutting several types of joints including dovetails, inlaying techniques, cutting simple veneer patterns, gluing techniques and understanding which finishes work best for the results you desire. By the end of the day you will be on your way to a better understanding of fine woodworking craftsmanship.

### **JOINERY**

Marc has had nearly 1000 people travel from around the world to attend his weeklong joinery class at his school. He has decided to come and spend a half a day showing some of his favorite joints. The day will start with a quick review of sharpening scrapers and chisels to razor edges. He will then discuss how to select a joint based on strength, grain direction, movement and the quality of fit. Demonstrations will include how to hand cut dovetails both through and half blind, mortise and tenons and the strongest joint in woodworking, the hip joint.

### **METHODS OF WOODWORKING**

This workshop will be an intensive study of understanding how to work with wood with a series of great demonstrations. The focus of this process-oriented workshop is the development of skills that can be applied to building fine wood furniture. Marc will demonstrate different woodworking techniques, such as veneering, bending wood, carving (how to model in clay), inlay techniques, joinery working with stone, shaping and sculpting wood, and the process of developing the design. This workshop is for anyone wanting to take their furniture to the next level. Students will come away with a better understanding of how to embellish their work by adding details such as carving, sculpting, inlay, and veneer.

## *David Mitchell visits the Tool Master*

Last winter Dave, one of my neighbors, asked if I could help him for a few minutes. Seven days later, after 4 hours of work, the little favor was resolved. Now don't get the wrong impression here, I do enjoy doing these "little" projects, and know that I can count on three of my neighbors to keep creating them for me. I enjoy getting a little company in the shop, a welcome break from the monotony of working alone. It is also an opportunity to share the news of the neighborhood, as well as share my knowledge of woodworking.

The project that Dave brought over was a "simple" request to lengthen a pair of boards by six inches. They were the side rails of an antique bed frame. After explaining to him that wood will glue long-grain to long-grain, but will not bond end-grain to end-grain, we decided to use dowels.

The first step was squaring off the ends of the 7 foot long boards with my hand planes. Now, I've collected a few good hand planes, but it only took a few strokes with a 45 degree bench plane cutting end grain to convince me that there was a reason I've been lusting for that Lie-Nielsen low-angle jack plane. The exercise was exacerbated by the fact that my bench plane was dull.

After making up a few new cuss-words, we managed to get a tight joint with dowels. Dave was very appreciative, and somewhat chagrined about his "simple" request, so much so that he gave me an old hand plane that he had had lying around in his garage.

It is a 1 1/4 inch wooden body rabbit plane. The knickers on both sides were definitely abused. The plane body was dirty, but seemed straight and sound. I managed to coax the wooden wedge loose and removed the iron, only to find that it was rusted. It was going to take a considerable amount of lapping to get a cutting edge on this.

With my initial enthusiasm waning, I set it aside for a few days. Lamenting that I had several chisels and plane irons in need of new edges, I then remembered that the ***Guild had a Veritas sharpening system available via their tool rental program.*** It proved to be as simple as finding my last Northern Woods newsletter to make arrangements to borrow this system.

The Veritas Sharpening System comes with the manufacturer's 70 page User's Manual. Getting to read this manual is almost worth the cost and effort of renting the sharpening station. The first half of the manual is what you'd expect: Unpacking & Safety, General Principles, Operation, Freehand Sharpening, Care & Maintenance and Troubleshooting. But the last 30 pages is Appendix D: General Sharpening Procedures. This Appendix talks about sharpening in theory, not just about using the Veritas Sharpening system. In fact, it specifically recommends bench stones or water stones for some types of edges.



For those of you that are put off by 70 pages of fine print, the guild has supplied a separate two page addendum, which covers exactly what you need to know about the care and feeding of this particular machine. You know, the little secret tricks that can only be documented by a user of the tool - the default choices of what grits are placed on which platters, how to change a sanding disc, and so on.

The best nugget of information, at least for me, was the drawings attached to this Guild-supplied addendum, which finally explained the anguish I felt during my previous attempts to sharpen plane irons. It turns out that bench plane irons often have tapered sides instead of parallel. After carefully measuring, regrinding, and resharpening my plane irons, I now can set the plane iron level with the lateral adjustment lever also approximately centered. From prior attempts of grinding plane irons, I'd had a couple planes set at the extreme lateral adjustment to keep them straight and level. At least now, I'm not embarrassed whenever someone else looks at my bench planes.

I will also confess that my neighbors enjoyed learning about the the Veritas sharpening system – each got a demonstration when they stopped over with their latest projects.

The Guild has a number of tools available for a nominal rental fee. This is a valuable resource that is included with your membership. Here is the listing of what is currently available:

- Drill bit sharpener for standard twist and brad point bits (professional grade system)
- HVLP sprayer (American Turbine AT-3000)
- Benchtop mortising machine (Jet JBM-5, donation courtesy of Steve Holzgraefe)
- Photography light and backdrop kit (professional grade)
- Starrett 36" machinist straight edge (used for machine setup and alignment)
- Veneering kit (vacuum bag)
- Veritas power sharpening system

**Rental Fee** is \$10 per use.

**Rental Time** a tool may be rented depends on demand, however it is typically at least a week or more...

The HVLP sprayer and Veritas sharpening system both require a \$20 **Refundable Deposit** to ensure that they come back clean. The deposit will not be refunded if cleaning is required.
